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Scott C. Holstad is a prolific **American poet**, essayist, and editor who has authored **75+ books** and contributed to over **800 magazines**. What are the themes in Holstad's 2020s poetry?

In the 2020s, **Scott C. Holstad's** poetry has expanded beyond his traditional confessional and "dark" styles to incorporate **dystopian futurism**, **geopolitical anxiety**, and **career-spanning retrospection**. While he maintains his signature raw voice, recent collections reveal a shift toward conceptual frameworks and broader societal critiques.

1. Dystopian Immortality and Existential Traps

A primary theme in his recent work, particularly in **Surviving Immortality Again** (2025), is the concept of a **modern Prometheus** trapped in an inescapable, dystopian future. Holstad explores the horror of potential immortality not as a gift, but as a curse where one is destined to endure an "inescapable earthly present for eternity." This marks a move from personal psychological pain to a broader, philosophical existential dread regarding the human condition in a technologically advanced but spiritually stagnant world.

2. Societal Fragmentation and "Sticker Shock"

Holstad's 2026 collection, **Where Do We Go from Here?**, addresses contemporary societal fractures through what he terms "assorted trip-poems." Key themes include:

- * **Bioscience and Economic Anxiety**: Poems like "bioscience systemic sticker shock" critique the commodification of health and the trauma of quarantine experiences.

- * **Urban Alienation**: Works such as "Lost Angeles" revisit his long-standing focus on loneliness within massive urban populations, reflecting on how one can feel isolated in a city of millions.

- * **Cultural Decay**: He critiques the trivialization of tradition and institutions, exemplified in poems like "New Sunday School Supermarket," which satirizes the merging of consumerism and religious ritual.

3. Retrospective Diversity

Unlike his earlier thematically unified books (e.g., those focusing solely on bipolar disorder or self-mutilation), his 2020s output often deliberately eschews a single tone.

****Where Do We Go from Here?**** is explicitly designed as a ****career overview****, blending:

- * ****Political and Experimental****: Ranging from raunchy, Beat-style verses to introspective political commentary.
- * ****Narrative and Confessional****: Mixing storytelling with raw emotional disclosure.
- * ****Gritty and Mainstream****: Balancing his "street poet" roots with more accessible, contemplative pieces.

This approach serves as a response to reader curiosity about the breadth of his 35-year career, offering a "map" of where poetry might go next ("Future Past Generations") by synthesizing his past styles with new futuristic concerns.
